#### Giving Zeros Distorts a Student's Grades

## Responses to Frequent Questions Green about the Middle School Grading Floor

**Greenville County Schools** 



The grading floor allows students who make an effort to do their work to pull up their grades. Students who make little or no effort to do their work are addressed through interventions by each school, which include lunch time work makeup sessions, after-school study hall, parent conferences, and in-school suspension.

More students are completing their assignments because they are held accountable to do their work. For work not completed, students receive a temporary grade of 50 (Coded Not Handed In) until they complete the assignment. Schools provide opportunities before, during and after school for students to make up work.

Holding middle school students to a high standard to complete work versus giving zeros teaches them self-direction, perseverance, and a strong work ethic. This helps prepare them for the demands of high school, college and the workforce.

Use of the grading floor will provide consistency in how all middle schools grade students. There will be further discussions regarding related grading practices such as dropping the lowest grade and curving grades as the middle schools transition to a consistent grading floor for 2016-17.

Students will be better prepared for high school because their middle school teachers will have a greater understanding of what their students know so they can more effectively address their individual needs.
