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
Participating families received a gift card; and the school received a \$200 gift card donation.



ELA Tip: The most important thing a parent can do to develop literacy is to read with your child. Questions to ask your child while reading include:

Comprehension Question Suggestions Questions to ask before reading

- Point to the title. What is the title of the book?
- Point to the author's name. What is the author's job?
- Point to the illustrator's name. What is the illustrator's job?

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- What does the cover tell you about the book? What do the pictures tell you?
- What do you think the book is about?
- What are you curious to find out about this book?
- What do you already know about this book?
- What do you want to learn?
- Why are you reading this book?
 Questions to ask during reading
- What do you think will happen next?
- What is the problem in the book?
- Why do you think the character did that?
- When you were reading this part, what were you picturing in your head?

Questions to ask after reading Children reading at LEVEL AA through LEVEL D could be asked...

- 1. Why does the title make sense?
- 2. How many words (or letters) are on the page?
- 3. Who is the story mostly about?
- If you could add a page to the book, what would you write? (Here we want to see if the child recognizes the pattern or the sound that all the words start with.)
- 5. What did you like about the story?
- 6. Does it remind you of anything in your life? (Text to Self)
- 7. Which of the characters did you like best? Why?
- 8. Point to your favorite picture in the story. Why do you like it?

Children reading at LEVEL D through LEVEL K could be asked any of the above, plus...

What is the main problem in the story?


- 2. How is the problem solved?
- 3. What is the setting of the story (where did it take place)?
- 4. What is one thing that happens to the main character?
- 5. Does it remind you of any other books you have read? (Text to Text)
- 6. Is this a non-fiction (real) or fiction book?
- 7. Name one person you know who would like this story. Why?
- 8. Who was your favorite character in the story? Why?
- 9. Who was your least favorite character in the story? Why?

Children reading at LEVEL K through LEVEL O could be asked any of the above, plus...

- Does it remind you of anything that has happened in the world? (Text to World)
- 2. Why do you think the author wrote the book?
- 3. How does the main character change from the beginning of the story to the end?
- 4. Name 3 things that you know about the main character.
- 5. Are there any characters that remind you of yourself or someone that you know?
- 6. What is the most important thing to remember in the story?
- 7. What is something you learned from this story? (a lesson, fact, idea)

Math Tip

To help support your child in math, please work with them to achieve automaticity with basic math facts. Automaticity is the ability to say the answer to a problem immediately after reading the fact. Please work with your child to achieve Fluency with addition and subtraction



in grades K – 2nd; multiplication and division facts are the major competency in grades in 3rd -5th.
